Step Twelve - "Having had a spiritual awakening as the result of these steps, we tried to carry this message to alcoholics, and to practice these principles in all our affairs."

"The joy of living is the theme of A.A.'s Twelfth Step, and action is its key word. Here we turn outward toward our fellow alcoholics who are still in distress. Here we experience the kind of giving that asks no rewards. Here we begin to practice all Twelve Steps of the program in our daily lives so that we and those about us may find emotional sobriety. When the Twelfth Step is seen in its full implication, it is really talking about the kind of love that has no price tag on it.

"Our Twelfth Step also says that as a result of practicing all the Steps, we have each found something called a spiritual awakening. To new A.A.'s, this often seems like a very dubious and improbable state of affairs. 'What do you mean when you talk about a "spiritual awakening"?' they ask.

"Maybe there are as many definitions of spiritual awakening as there are people who have had them. But certainly, each genuine one has something in common with all the others. And these things which they have in common are not too hard to understand. When a man or a woman has a spiritual awakening, the most important meaning of it is that he has now become able to do, feel, and believe that which he could not do before on his unaided strength and resources alone. He has been granted a gift which amounts to a new state of consciousness and being. He has been set on a path which tells him he is really going somewhere, that life is not a dead end, not something to be endured or mastered. In a very real sense, he has been transformed because he has laid hold of a source of strength which, in one way or another, he had hitherto denied himself. He finds himself in possession of a degree of honesty, tolerance, unselfishness, peace of mind, and love of which he had thought himself quite incapable. What he has received is a free gift, and yet usually, at least in some small part, he has made himself ready to receive it."

Tradition Twelve - "Anonymity is the spiritual foundation of all our traditions, ever reminding us to place principles before personalities."

"... anonymity is real humility at work. It is an all-pervading spiritual quality which today keynotes A.A. life everywhere. Moved by the spirit of anonymity, we try to give up our natural desires for personal distinction as A.A. members both among fellow alcoholics and before the general public. As we lay aside these very human aspirations, we believe that each of us takes part in the weaving of a protective mantle which covers our whole Society and under which we may grow and work in unity.

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Twelfth Step Principle

Note: About the A.A. Principles - Bill W., considered each Step to be a spiritual principle in and of itself. In the *Twelve Steps and Twelve Traditions*, he outlined the spiritual principles behind each Step. The most important of all the principles is humility.

Service

In Step Twelve, some people think of the spiritual awakening as “a” result, not “the” result. This one tiny word, however, makes an enormous difference. The spiritual awakening that allows us to carry the message and practice the A.A. principles in our affairs comes from our step work. Now with Step Twelve, we are armed with an awakening that allows us to serve others. **Service** takes many forms but in Step Twelve it is all about “consideration” for another suffering alcoholic or another person. The key to consideration is thoughtful behavior. Being thoughtful means thinking about what we can do for those around us and how our actions will affect them. Consideration leads us to help an alcoholic, a friend or stranger in need.

Whether being of **service**, we keep the honesty and humility to see that the world does not revolve around us. Maintaining awareness, discipline, and willingness to perform these acts, we approach those in need with courage and integrity, hoping to do what we can and keeping faith that we will make a difference. In this way, we touch others with our sense of responsibility and brotherly love.



In our darkest hours, using these principles for the benefit of others will help us escape from negativity. Service gets us out of our own heads and into the world. In our active alcoholism, we were not a part of the world around us, but now, through us, the principles of A.A. move in our actions. With each act of kindness, we find ourselves feeling more and more blessed to finally feel involved in something.

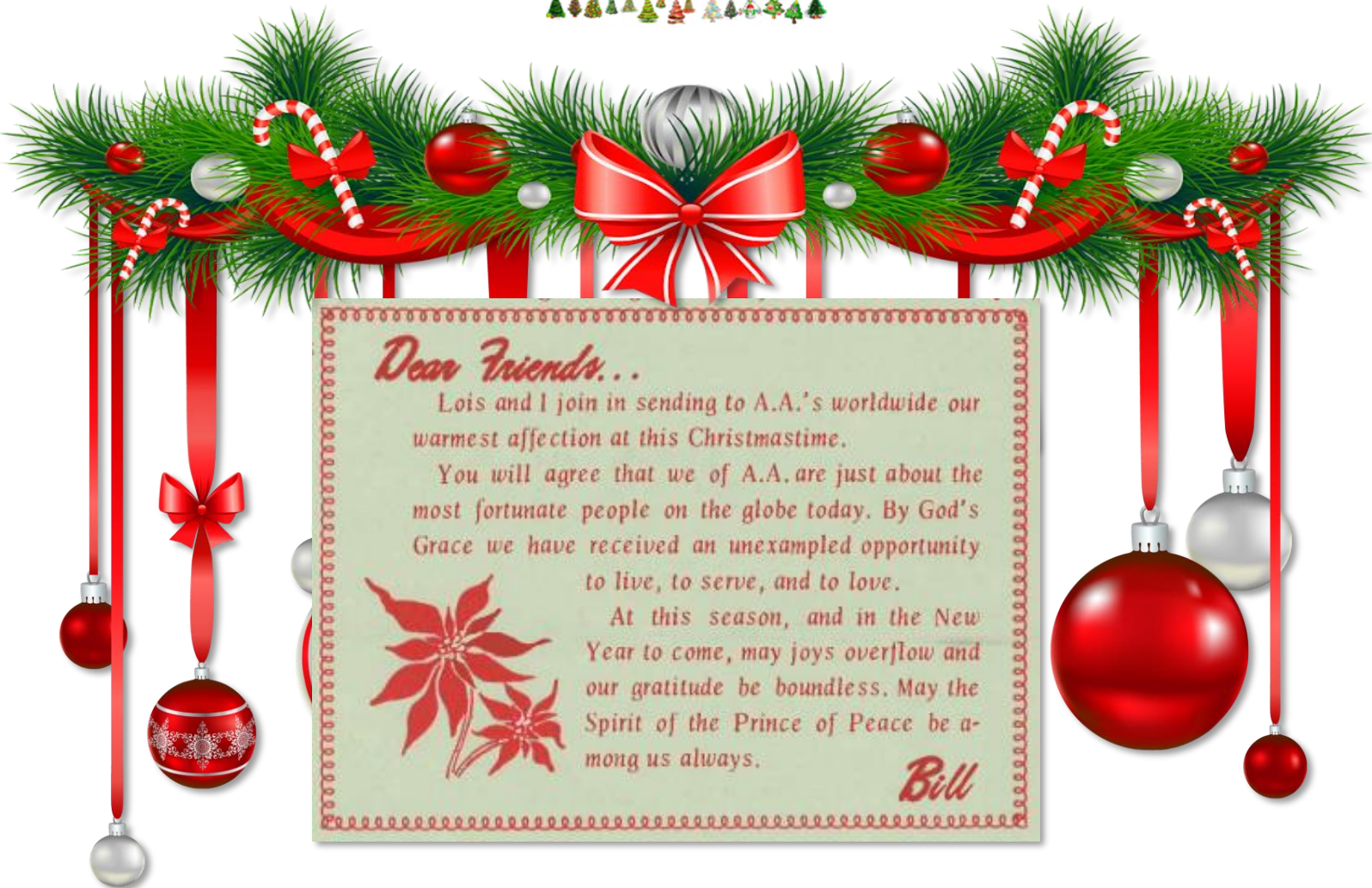

Here are some tips for having an all-round ball without a drop of alcohol.



1 Line up extra A.A. activities for the holiday season. Arrange to take newcomers to meetings, answer the phones at a clubhouse or central office, speak with dishes, or visit the alcoholic ward at a hospital.



2 Be host to A.A. friends, especially newcomers. If you don't have a place where you can throw a formal party, take one person to a diner and spring for the coffee.



3 Keep your A.A. telephone list with you all the time. If a drinking urge or panic comes—postpone everything else until you've called an A.A.



4 Find out about the special holiday parties, meetings, or other celebrations

given by groups in your area, and go. If you're timid, take someone newer than you are.



5 Skip any drinking occasion you are nervous about. Remember how clever you were at excuses when drinking? Now put the talent to good use. No office party is as important as saving your life.



6 If you have to go to a drinking party and can't take an A.A. with you, keep some candy handy.



7 Don't think you have to stay late. Plan in advance an "important date" you have to keep.



8 Worship in your own way.



9 Don't sit around brooding. Catch up on those books, museums, walks, and letters.



10 Don't start now getting worked up about all those holiday temptations. Remember—"one day at a time."



11 Enjoy the true beauty of holiday love and joy. Maybe you cannot give material gifts—but this year, you can give love.



12 "Having had a . . ." No need to spell out the Twelfth Step here, since you already know it.

Don't pick up that first drink and go to A.A. Meetings!"



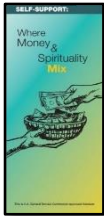
A·A· Seventh Tradition Contributions and Donations

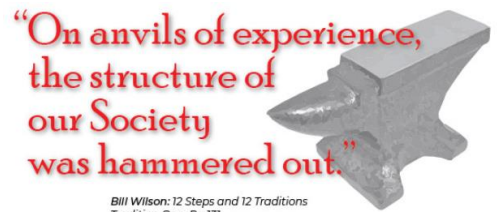

A.A. History - Did You Know?

This month, we continue our look back in American history before A.A. to see how the past in some indirect and/or direct way influenced and led to the formation of Alcoholics Anonymous. As you read this bit of history, you'll see some of the same program formats that gave A.A. its present-day structure. You may think that some of these facts have nothing to do with the history of A.A., but I do not believe that. The situation and the climate of the nation all led to the formation of A.A. Besides, these facts are an interesting part of American history.



On January 1, 1889, Della Mary Gavin (Sister Mary Ignatia) was born in Shanvally, County Mayo, Ireland. Sister Ignatia worked with Dr. Bob to help admit alcoholics into St. Thomas Hospital in Akron, Ohio, starting in 1939. She surmounted obstacles to personally care for thousands of alcoholics over the next several decades, both in Akron and later at St. Vincent Charity Hospital in Cleveland. Beloved by all who were associated with or helped by her, she was commonly referred to as the "Angel of Alcoholics Anonymous." Sister Mary Ignatia was also known by many who suffered from alcoholism as the alcoholics' "Angel of Hope."



On August, 1890, Elvin ("Bunky") Morton Jellinek was born in New York, NY. E. Morton Jellinek was an alcoholism researcher, who coined the expression "the disease concept of alcoholism", and significantly accelerated the movement towards the medicalization of drunkenness and alcohol habituation. In fact, Jellinek was a pioneering figure in the study of alcoholism.



On March 4, 1891, Lois Wilson (nee Burnham) was born at 182 Clinton Street in Brooklyn, NY in a spacious brownstone in the affluent section of Brooklyn Heights. A back room served as her father's medical office. At this time Brooklyn was a separate city (it became a borough of New York City in 1898). Lois was the eldest of six children. Lois also had a baby sister, Mathilda, who was sickly since her difficult birth and died before she was a year old. Lois' father ensured that all the children had the best educations. Lois began her schooling with a new form of pre-school education imported from Germany that was called "kindergarten." As a youngster at Emerald Lake in Vermont, she was quite the tomboy and loved fishing, swimming, sailing, climbing trees, catching frogs and picking berries during long early morning walks. She attended Friends School and Packer Collegiate (an all-girls school) for grades one through twelve and matured into a brilliant and artistically talented woman. She was a co-founder of Al-Anon Family Groups together with her neighbor and friend Anne B.



In September 1894, Bill W's parents, Emily Griffith and Gilman Wilson, were married. Then, on November 26, 1895, Bill W was born in a room behind a bar in the Wilson House (formerly the Barrows House aka the Mt Aeolus Inn and Tavern) a village hotel run by his grandmother, Helen Barrows Wilson. Bill was named after his paternal grandfather, William C Wilson, who was quite prominent in the community. According to Bill's sister Dorothy, their grandfather was an alcoholic who found sobriety through a profound spiritual experience while hiking on Mt Aeolus.
