Right-Sized for the New Year

On page 30 of *The Twelve Steps and Twelve Traditions* readers are told, "We found that we must reconsider or die. We found many in AA who once thought as we did. They helped us get down to our **right size**. By their example they showed us that humility and intellect could be compatible, provided we placed humility first. When we began to do that, we received the gift of faith, a faith which works. This faith is for you, too."

During this time of year many find themselves in a posture of reconsideration. Some reconsider what they will eat or how they will exercise, while others reconsider in what new ways they will use their time and their resources with friends and family. In one way or another, the turning of the calendar invites us to reconsider our way of living in order to decide what still fits and what no longer does, whether that be our clothes, our practices or our old ideas. Thankfully, we AA's have a solution for such difficult and troubling work, especially during what might be a difficult and troubling time of year. That solution is humility, the moment to moment, decision by decision work of being "right-sized."

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But how to be right-sized when we as alcoholics know that our first thoughts/reactions are often way too high and mighty (grandiose pride) or way too low and dirty (shameful pride)? How am I supposed to moderate my "right" size when it is I who constantly puffs myself up and tears myself down? How do we correctly examine our desires and hopes for 2024 when we have all the previous years of 'stinking thinking' blurring and distorting our sincere examination? Quite simply, on our own we cannot. The great news is, thanks to AA we are not alone!

It can be troubling for any alcoholic to try to accept that their first thought is often not the right-sized thought, but what exactly is the most troubling part? In short, pride. Our pride, our native language as alcoholics, tells us that our first feelings and thoughts are brilliant and should be acted on immediately. Our pride tells us that we should "go big or go home" and if we fail at "going big" our home should then be a pile of trash. Our pride is what balloons us to poppable size and our pride is also the pin that pops the same balloon. What we need then is the humility to surround ourselves with other brothers and sisters who are sincerely trying to be as right-sized as possible as much as possible, always focusing on humble progress, not prideful perfection.

Our ego, /pride, left to its own devices, will never be right-sized because our addicted ego thinks that the world exists because of ME, instead of accepting that I exist thanks to the world and all that the world entails (even the parts I don't like). However, if that ego/pride is handed over to the the will of a Higher Power (by regularly going to meetings, sincerely studying the principles, working with a sponsor, and being of service to others) it can be transformed into a powerful and humble force, a field of love and healing made real and visible in the world, a world where each of us fits in "just right" when we let go of the ever-deluded idea that life is about what our prideful ego wants.

May this New Year be an opportunity for all of us to examine the size of what "we" want versus the size and scope and focus of what our own Higher Power may want from us. May our ego/pride decrease and the humble love and healing of the Fellowship increase in our individual hearts and thos our shared communities.
