Step 7: Humbly asked him to remove our shortcomings.

Tradition 7 (long form): The A.A. groups themselves ought to be fully supported by the voluntary contributions of their own members. We think that each group should soon achieve this ideal; that any public solicitation of funds using the name of Alcoholics Anonymous is highly dangerous, whether by groups, clubs, hospitals, or other outside agencies; that acceptance of large gifts from any source, or of contributions carrying any obligation whatever, is unwise. Then too, we view with much concern those A.A. treasuries which continue, beyond prudent reserves, to accumulate funds for no stated A.A. purpose. Experience has often warned us that nothing can so surely destroy our spiritual heritage as futile disputes over property, money, and authority.

Concept VII: The Conference recognizes that the Charter and the Bylaws of the General Service Board are legal instruments: that the Trustees are thereby fully empowered to manage and conduct all of the world service affairs of Alcoholics Anonymous. It is further understood that the Conference Charter itself is not a legal document: that it relies instead upon the force of tradition and the power of the A.A. purse for its final effectiveness.

"Time Is On Our Side" by Zac W

Was your experience in addiction anything like mine? Did it feel like you were the white rabbit in Alice in Wonderland, always late for a very important date or missing some answer just out of reach? During the 26 years I experienced life run by alcohol, ego-delusion and anger I always felt like time was running out in one way or another. I felt like I was late, wrong, misunderstood, left out, betrayed and not invited to some kind of "life party" that many others seemed to be enjoying. Time always felt like it was up for me, and this made it easy for me to act out, cause trouble and make my misery deepen and worsen.

Before Recovery I believed that time was mine, that this was my life and that my life was not the "right" life in some horrible but invisible way. I felt it was all up to me to turn back time, speed up time, or escape time altogether through oblivion. Life was always a ticking clock that I wanted to jump out of, strangle or smash to smithereens. It was only my drunk and angry self shooting through the world of time as fast or as slow as I wanted, and deadly substances were the only fuel to make me go or the only brakes to make me stop.

The Big Book puts the problem we faced this way: "Most people try to live by self propulsion. Each person is like an actor who tries to run the whole show; is forever trying to arrange the lights, the ballet, the scenery and the rest of the players in his own way. If his arrangements would only stay put, if only people would do as he wished, the show would be great. Everybody, including himself, would be pleased. Life would be wonderful...What usually happens? The show doesn't come off very well. He begins to think life doesn't treat him right. He decides to exert himself more...Is he not, even in his best moments, a producer of confusion rather than harmony?" (61). Thankfully AA and the world of Recovery offers a real and effective (and timeless!) solution to the addict's problem of time: gratitude.

Recovery has taught me to understand that I did nothing to deserve life, nothing to earn even my very first breath. I did my best to run my life the way I wanted and that brought me continual and inescapable despair, pain and ruin. I did nothing to deserve the first, second and third chances at Recovery I was given. I did not earn or deserve surviving the many close calls to death that time saw me through. In short, I am so grateful today to know that this life is a gift, the desperation that came before is a gift and the chance to live one day at a time instead of all time all at once is a gift. Time is on our side, brothers and sisters, because time is not ours. Time, like all things, is the purview of something far beyond ourselves, and for that, I am grateful.
